ELEVEN ARRESTED YESTERDAY

Yesterday was a banner day for the police court. That is, from a point of numbers. Eleven drunks and vagrants were rounded up. Out of that number one paid his fine of ten dollars, and the rest were given five days of cleaning streets. However, four of that number this morning "Couldn't see the instruction for the dust", and are now eating two meals a day at the city jail, and the menu is not an extensive one either, just bread and water. "Honorable" George Peterson, who yesterday informed the police authorities that street work was below his dignity, this morning complained to Marshal Rayburn that he was not feeling well. The thin diet and jail will soon lose its charms for him and it is expected that he will be picking up cobble stones before Monday.

Superintendent Stoner is working wonders on the streets and alleys with the squad of vagrants. Those of them who agree to work are taken to the restaurants and given excellent meals every day.

ALMOST COMPLETED

G. D. Goodnough this morning began the work of putting in place the new fire alarm and by this evening practically had it installed. The mechanism is located at the base of the fire bell tower and has a crank attachment so that when the alarm specifying the ward has been given the general fire alarm can be rung by simply turning the crank.

Electricians are also at work stringing the wires and installing the electrical device by which telephone central will be enabled to ring the alarm bell. It is only a question of few days now until the whole system will be completed. Chief Jones is arranging a map whereby the city will be divided into districts with the necessary code of signals so that when an alarm is given, the department will know within at least two blocks where the fire is located.

O. R. & N. SURVEYOR HERE

The work of enlarging, remodeling and general improving of the O. R. & N. round house, has received its final impetus. H. A. Braden, chief civil engineer for the O. R. & N. company arrived last night from Portland with a crew of surveyors, and this morning proceeded to survey and lay out cross streets, new tracks, and general rearrangement of the company's property in accordance with the contract which the company entered into with the city of La Grande. Mr. Braden says the work will be rushed as fast as possible.

NOTICED THE IMPROVEMENT

I. A. Bowen, who was a visitor in La Grande, Wednesday says among other things in a writup of this place, "La Grande is just taking up the proposition of a gravity water system, bringing in a supply of pure water 30 miles from Beaver creek. It is an important move on the part of the Beet City. As it is now they are short of water and can only sprinkle about two hours a day, consequently the streets are dusty."
