A JUST "HOLLER"

In the Sunset Magazine June-July 1906 number, a very well written and illustrated article from the pen of Donald McDonald, entitled, "Portland the key to all" appears, and the people of Union County and La Grande, have reason to take offense at the slight given this grand County and thriving city, as in this article both Union County and La Grande are conspicuous by their absence. The beautiful and productive Grande Ronde Valley is not mentioned once in the article, while other portions of the State have received attention at the hands of the author.

Even in the mention of manufactures of the State, Union County has no mention. One paragraph of the article read, "The last census shows the production in the manufactures of \$112, per capita against \$93 for agriculture. Portland has 2500 manufacturing plants with \$40,000,000 capital invested, employing 25,000 wage earners. In the State are 4500 manufactures with a capital of \$50,000,000 Oregon woollens, Oregon paper, Oregon condensed cream, Oregon furniture, Oregon harness, Oregon saddles and whips and Oregon canned fruit are known throughout the land.

No mention of Oregon Sugar, the only sugar factory in the State being located at La Grande, in Union County. If the census referred to by the author had been carefully studied, he would have found that the last census rated Union County third in the State in the employment of labor.

Another paragraph, "Portland seeks to be a city among cities and not a city in the wilderness." The thriving interior cities of Salem, Eugene, Baker City, Pendleton, The Dalles, Astoria, Oregon City, Corvallis, Marshfield, Roseburg, Ashland, Grants Pass, Albany, McMinnville, Medford and Dallas, these are leagued with Portland to make a greater Oregon. With the development of the State more than one of them will claim 25,000 or 30,000 people within the next decade.

We know that La Grande will make the claim, and it is as thriving an interior city as is in the State, which can be verified by the commercial travelers from Portland houses. Again we are led to remark that the article has slighted one of the best portions of the State of Oregon, in neglecting to give proper mention of Beautiful and Fertile Grande Ronde Valley, Resourceful Union County, and thriving La Grande. We want the world

to know that we are a healthy youngster and we "holler" when not noticed.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, is going to investigate the canned beans factories in the East. When the government gets through with canned goods investigation there will not be a stone left unturned. Anything that looks like canned goods will have to pass under the scrutiny of Uncle Sam's eye, no matter if it is meats, oysters, sardines, or as just stated, beans. Of course this is good news for good old Boston.
