TO RESTORE BATTLESHIP IRONSIDE

(Scripps News Association)

Washington, D. C., August 15.—The naval constructors are much interested in seeking the old plans and other information relating to the frigate Constitution, which is to be restored at the Boston Navy Yard to a condition and appearance as nearly resembling the ship as first planned as possible. The original plans long ago disappeared. They were probably destroyed by much handling as was often the case with such papers. The first copy is still in existence, and is believed to be authentic, although there was no such thing as tracing in those early times. These plans were found some years ago in a library in Philadelphia, and delivered to the Bureau of Construction and Repair. They had evidently been handed around from one to another person as of no special value, even in an historic way. The officers of today say it probably never occurred to the persons who possessed the plans that there would ever be any use for them in a construction way. The only information now missing is concerning the figurehead of the ship. Upon that point, opinions differ, some of the officers holding that the ship carried merely a scroll, and others, that it was on an elaborate design. There will be conscientious care taken to restore the old Constitution as she was in her prime

ESTHER MITCHELL IS SICK

Esther Mitchell is lying close to death on a cot in the county jail at Seattle, and may, by the intervention of death, be saved from trial for murder in the first degree for slaying her brother George. For four days the girl has tossed delirious upon a fever-stricken bed, but not until yesterday afternoon did the jail physician decide that she has typhoid fever.

Esther Mitchell since her confinement in the jail has enjoyed fairly good health until about a week ago. At that time she complained of the prison fare and of her inability to eat it.

Four days ago she took to her cot, and has not been able to rise from it since. The girl murmurs is but a shadow of her former self. Always frail, the confinement has worn her down to a mere shadow.

The cell off the jailer's office in which she is confined is fitted up as a sickroom and the girl is given the best of care. The jailers who see the most of her are candid in saying that they doubt if she will recover. The girl, however, laughs at their fears and declares that her sickness will all be over in a few days and that she will be ready for trial early in October, when the prosecuting attorney desires to try the case. The jailers, however, are not so hopeful as the girl. If she does not improve the judge of the criminal court will be asked to order her sent to the county hospital where she can be given better attention than at the county jail.

RYNEARSON ROAD DISCONTINUED

The adjourned session of the county court which met yesterday, besides listening to arguments on the Minam liquor license, set a movement on foot whereby the present Ryneason road on the north side of the river is to be discontinued and a new road built on this side, commencing at the head of Marion street.

The present road was not sufficiently wide, and for other reasons the court saw fit to make this change. The county road viewers will meet on the 24th of August to view and lay out this proposed road. It will, according to present plans, commence at the end of Marion Street and follow up the river on the south side until it intersects with the old Ryneason road at Oro del. To insure a road for ranchers on the north side and also for their own use, the Palmer Lumber Company will construct a road from the Ryneason road at a point nearer the Ryneason residence, south to the river and build a bridge so that when completed the present road will turn at the Ryneason house and come south so as to connect with Marion Street.

Then from the point where the new road is to meet Marion Street, the new county road will begin. After the proper procedure has been adhered to, the old road, which has done service so many years, will be discontinued, and all residents who live on the north side can use the proposed bridge for an entrance way to this city.
