GENERAL WEATHER SUMMARY

The long spell of dry weather was broken by showers on Sunday and Monday, which were heaviest in the neighborhood of the Blue Mountains. The rainfall in the Willamette valley was very light and barely sufficient to lay the dust. Forest fires increased during the week, and the atmosphere in the west and north portion of the State became very smoky. The rains were not heavy enough to extinguish the fires, but they cleared the atmosphere of smoke and made it harder for the fires to spread. The mornings in the coast counties, as a rule, were either cloudy or foggy, and the afternoons were clear. Elsewhere up to the beginning of the rains fair weather prevailed, with unusually high temperatures. Friday and Saturday were very warm days, and in the interior of the State the maximum temperature ranged between ninety and one hundred degrees. The prevailing winds were northwesterly.
