AFFAIRS ARE MORE TANGLED

Chicago Aug. 15.—General Judge Bel- beam this morning appointed Chas. G. Dawes receiver of Stensland co-operative store under a bond of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The receivership increases the legal entanglement of the Milwaukee Avenue bank. A receiver has been appointed for the Automobile Supply Company whose assets are sixty thousand dollars and owing the bank's quarter million, the Polish National Alliance has entered a suit against the bank for fifty thousand dollars damages. Fetzer, the first receiver appointed for the bank began paying twenty percent to depositors this morning.

NEGRO FARMERS HOLD MEETING

Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 16.—Under the auspices of the Southern Negro Farmers' Educational Bureau a large convention of negro farmers met here this morning. The session was opened by Superintendent Stanley P. Mitchell, who will be one of the principal speakers at the meetings. The principal object of the bureau is to educate the negro on the importance of the farmer to the Government, the retention of his farm lands and the importance of doing everything possible to prevent the negro farmers from being supplanted by white farmers. Another point is to teach the negroes to be more provident, raise more of the necessities of life and buy less on credit.

ANNUAL LAKE GEORGE REGRETTA

Hague Aug. 16.—The nineteenth annual regretta of the Lake George Regretta Association will be held here this afternoon and promises to be unusually interesting. The feature of the regretta will be a ten-mile race for automobile boats. A large number of very fast boats have been entered in the contest. The prize is a magnificent silver cup offered by Mr. Broesel, owner of the 35-footer Bunny. The principal prize for the rowing contest is the \$400 cup founded by Town Topics. The cup has been won in four consecutive years by four different competitors. The race will be a handicap event.

PAN AMERICAN CONGRESS

Rio Janeiro, Aug. 16.—The Pan American congress today adopted a resolution providing for the division of customs and duties. The Chili delegates today submitted a plan to make uniform statistics and report the regulations uniformly from all countries. The Gra Drago committee meets this afternoon and it is understood that a serious disagreement may develop. Central America, Uruguay and Columbia want the Drago eliminated from the program while Brazil, United States and Mexico want it referred to the Hague conference without comment. Argentina is undecided.

ESTHER MITCHELL IMPROVING

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 16.—It is the opinion of Dr. Snyder, the jail physician, that Esther Mitchell will recover within a short time unless complications arise. The diagnosis indicated typhoid fever, but it is now believed the ailment is less serious. Mrs. Crawford is admitted to the girl's cell to minister to her wants and her visits are considered beneficial by the physician. Should Miss Mitchell recover she will go to trial next month for the murder of her brother. If her illness continues, a later date will be set.

REPRIMANDED BY JUSTICE

New York Aug. 16.—Officials of the Boston Rapid Transit were berated by Magistrate Higgins today. The general manager, Calderwood, Assistant Superintendent Smith, Chief Inspector Newberry were arraigned for exciting a riot and pleaded not guilty. They furnished a thousand dollar bond each to appear tomorrow. The magistrate scored the officials and said that he had witnessed scenes where disorders and death had resulted under their directions.

ANNOUNCING BIG STRIKE

LA GRANDE TO HAVE GOOD WATER.

almost hear the ripple and the gurgle of Beaver creek through huge pipe lines carrying sparkling drops of water, pure and unpolluted. But better than this, they will have this splendid water, brought from the cool and shady heights, at their disposal.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the City of La Grande.

We, the undersigned members of your special committee, accompanied by the city surveyor, appointed for the purpose of examining the quantity and quality of the water of Beaver Creek, with a view of obtaining an adequate water supply for the city of La Grande, beg to report as follows:—

We examined and measured the flow of water in Beaver Creek, at a point about ten miles above the mouth of the stream and found the water perfectly clear and as cold as the water of any of the streams coming from the higher mountains. The water is first class in every respect and is entirely free from any taste of vegetation or other organic matter. We measured the water flow at the place most convenient for obtaining material for constructing temporary dams in the stream, and found that there was 1,842, 431.89 gallons of water flowing in the stream during twenty four hours. This is the actual measurement of the water as measured on the surface of the gravel in the creek bed, without taking any account of water seeping through the gravel. It is our opinion that if the water could have been measured on bedrock, there is as much as two and one half million gallons now flowing in the stream during twenty four hours. And from observation and information obtained, the water is as low in the mountain stream now as it is at any time during the driest seasons.

We run a level from the lowest point on the ridge on the east side of Beaver creek and found that it would require a pipe line about two and one half miles in length to get the water out of Beaver Creek Canyon. This pipe line would be nearly in a direct line from the head of the pipe line to La Grande.

It is our opinion that there is sufficient water in Beaver Creek at the point where we made the examination, to supply all the requirements of the city of La Grande with pure, cold water of the very best quality.

The distance to La Grande from the point of the diversion of the water from Beaver Creek in a direct line is about thirteen miles and one half. The basin or watershed of Beaver Creek above the point of diversion is covered with a heavy growth of timber, principally black pine, and is all vacant government land excepting one quarter section, and the whole of the water shed is embraced in the Blue Mountain Forest Reserve, and by proper application to the Secretary of Agriculture, no doubt the city could have it set aside as a permanent water supply for the city of La Grande. The stream heads in the high mountains on a northern slope of the range, known as the Pocatantans or Powder River Peaks and for that reason the water is exceptionally cold and pure.

We therefore recommend, that proper action be immediately taken, to secure a water supply for the city from Beaver Creek, and that the Council employ and construct the city engineer to survey the pipe line from Beaver Creek, beginning at or near the point on the stream referred to in this report, to the city of La Grande, and to furnish plans and specifications, together with estimates of cost of construction of such a pipe line and to report the same to the City Council at the earliest possible date.
