El Paso, Tex., August 16.—By the explosion of an entire carload of dynamite at four o'clock yesterday at the Santa Eulalia mine, twelve miles from Chihuahua, Mexico, twelve people are killed outright and two score so seriously injured that they may die. The dead are frightfully mangled. A warehouse and dwelling near the car were demolished and almost every window of the entire camp was broken. Two Americans, whose names are unknown, are among the dead.

The cause of the explosion is unknown, but the finding of the corpse of a boy with a small rifle among the dead is believed to be the clue to the cause. It is thought he fired into the car causing the contents to explode.
