GENERAL NEWS

There are in the United States 3500 women working in foundries-furnaces and rolling mills.

R. O. Blair was arrested at Seattle charged with complicity in a recent great diamond robbery in New York City.

A Greek lives in Milwaukee, Wis., whose surname is Pappatheorokoumountourgeotopoulos. He answers to the name of Jack.

Charles Staegmaker, Wilkesbarre, Pa., brewer worth \$4,000,000, is dead at Los Angeles, aged 85 years. Death was caused by old age.

Claus Spreckles will rebuild on Van Ness Avenue, San Francisco, a residence on the site of the one burned last April. The new structure will cost \$800,000.

The authorities at Capetown, Africa, are alarmed at the persistence of the riots of the unemployed. The bulk of the rioters are colored men, so called "Cape boys," whose increasing numbers constitute a serious menace to the whites.

Governor Mickey, of Nebraska, has notified the board of fire and police commissioners of South Omaha, that they must keep all saloons closed on Sunday in case they fail to comply with the order the governor said he would institute proceedings for their removal.

The husband found her and took her back home. Last Wednesday she again disappeared and he is now searching for her.
