MERCILESS MASSACRE CONTINUES

(Scripps News Association)
St. Petersburg, Aug. 17.—The massacre of the Jews in Warsaw is continuing and the government is restoring repressive measures everywhere. Workmen and Cossacks fought at Kolpino and twenty men were killed and many more wounded. As a result of the troubles, twelve policemen are dead and four wounded at Warsaw. The government is arresting everybody suspected of agitating the revolt. Vragoff, a former member of the Douma was today arrested for inciting peasants in his districts. A conference of social democrats at Moscow was closed today by the police.
