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WHITE AND COLORED EDUCATORS

(Scripps News Association)

Dayton O., Aug. 90—The progress that has been made by the negroes of Ohio in the past twenty-five years, not only in the trades, but in the professions as well, and the great strides forward that they have taken towards the development of the negro character, are clearly and graphically displayed at the Ohio State Colored Educational and Industrial Exposition which opens here today. In connection with the exposition a meeting of colored and white educators will be held here, which will last through the whole week. Leaders in the uplifting of the colored race from Ohio and other parts of the United States are assembling here to attend the meeting. The purpose of the meeting and exposition is to prove that the negro deserved his emancipation, that he has advanced in such a degree as to deserve to be recognized by the best white citizens as worthy of aid and help in the movements to better his race.

Among the speakers who will be present will be Booker T. Washington, who will deliver the principal address on Saturday. Other speakers will be Mrs. Tarrell, wife of Judge Tarrell of Washington, who will give an address on the day that is to be devoted to women; President J. H. Jones, of Wilberforce university, and M. C. B. Mason Cincinnati, secretary of the Freedom's Aid Society. One of the interesting features of the representation of the battle of San Juan Hill will be by the the colored troops of Ohio.

THE VALUE OF THE TOAD
