LEFT WEALTH TO HIRED MAN

Topeka, Kans., Aug. 20.—James Johnson and Mrs. Dorothy Wilson of Washington county, have appealed to the supreme court of the state in the effort to break the will of their mother, the late Mrs. Elenora Johnson, who cut them off from a share in her property with bequests of \$5 each and left the bulk of her estate to a "friend" William White, a hired man. This estate consists of considerable personal property and an 80 acre farm in Gage county Nebraska. Under the will White holds a life interest in the real estate and on his death it is to revert to a number of Mrs. Johnson's grandchildren.

REFUSES TO PARDON TAYLOR

Telegram's Salem Bureau Aug. 20.—Governor Chamberlain has arrived at a decision in the matter of the petition for the pardon of Moses Taylor, the wealthy rancher who was sent to the penitentiary from Umatilla County February, 1906, for 2½ years for attempted arson, and has notified Taylor by letter that he would not extend any clemency in his case further than what was already being done. He is being allowed double time for working on the road gang.

Taylor is rated at \$100,000 and has spent thousands of dollars in an effort to secure a pardon but it is understood the Governor told him in a letter that he had better save his money for himself and family after he serves his time.

GENERAL WEATHER SUMMARY

During the first day of the week showers occurred in the northern coast counties and in the northwest portion of the State. These showers, as a rule, were light, and droughty conditions continue in practically all portions of the State. Forest fires are burning in many places and the atmosphere has become very smoky. It is not expected that the forest fires will be put out or the atmosphere cleared of smoke until good, soaking rains occur, and they are badly needed at the present time. The temperatures averaged about six degrees lower than the preceding week. The nights were about three degrees cooler than usual in the western counties and four degrees cooler than in eastern counties. The afternoon temperatures were about normal in all parts of the State. Light frosts were reported in a few exposed places in Tillamook County. The prevailing winds were westerly.

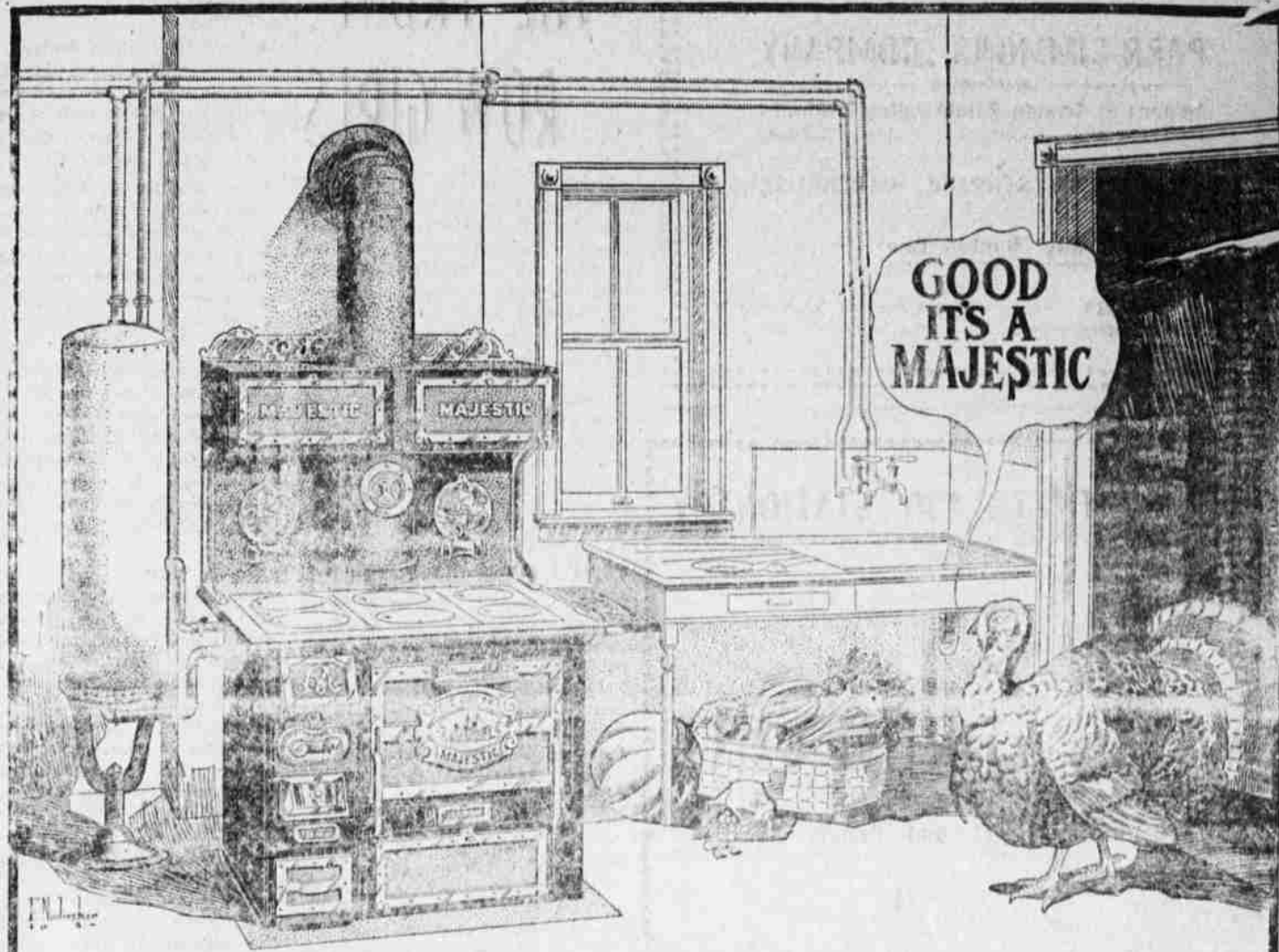
