VIEW OF A "MONEY MAKER"

Mr. Frank Leach, superintendent of the United States Mint in San Francisco, has been notified by the secretary of the treasury that gold from Alaska and Yukon will be minted this year in San Francisco, instead of Philadelphia, as heretofore. The output from that district last year was \$25,000,000.

Mr. Leach says this is only another one of the advantages accorded to San Francisco, and to which she is entitled on account of her importance as a distributing center.

Dr. Robert C. Yanney, State Health Officer, Portland, Oregon.

Dear Sir—The examination of the specimen of water from Eugene sent by Dr. Harris shows no contamination. There was an absolute failure to produce gas or even growth in fermentation tubes. Plates inoculated with varying quantities of the water failed to develop a single colony on any one.

The result is most remarkable and I fear an error somewhere before the water arrived here. It would be well to know just how this water was collected. Even the purest water usually shows some growth.

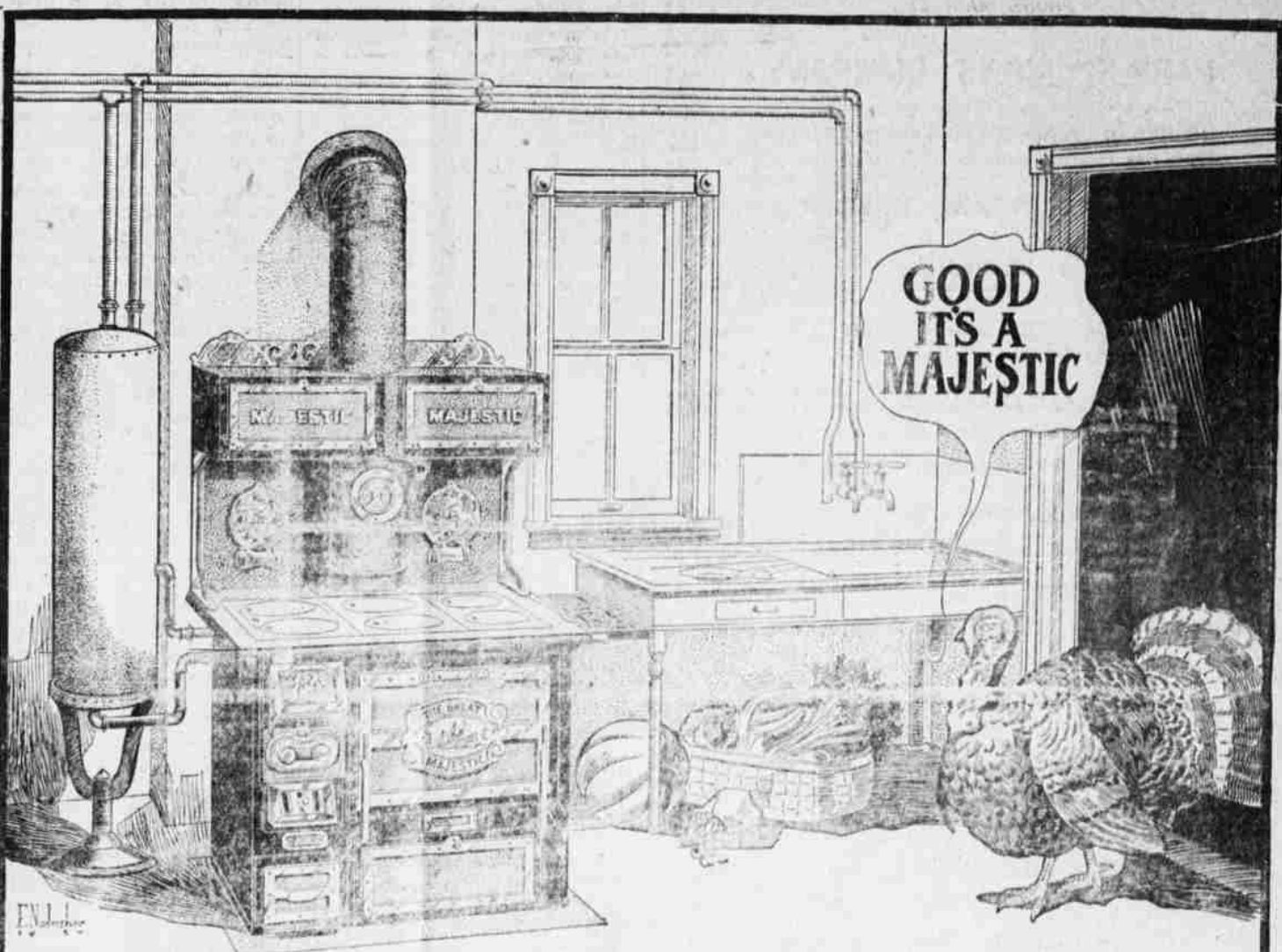
