**TO TEACH THE DEAF TO SPEAK**

(Scrapps News Association)  
Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 25—Educators interested in bettering the teaching and condition of the deaf and dumb are assembled here from all parts of the country, to attend the seventh annual summer meeting of the American Association to Promote the teaching of Speech to the Deaf, which opened today at Edgewood Park. At the opening session, Representative John Dalzell, of Pittsburg; President John B. Jackson and superintendent Dr. William N. Burt, of the institution for the Deaf of this state, delivered addresses of welcome. Nearly three hundred delegates from all parts of the United States are in attendance. Daily sessions will be held after today in the buildings of the Western Pennsylvania Institution for the Deaf until the end of the month. Among those who will deliver addresses and read important papers before the meetings will be Dr. A. D. E. Crouter, of Philadelphia. Dr. Alexander Graham Bell, of Washington, D. C.; Edmund Lyon of Rochester, N. Y.; J. Fearon, of Halifax, N. S.; Frank Driggs, of Ogden Utah, E. McKay Goodwin, of Morgantown, N. C.; J. W. Blattner, of Austin, Tex. and R. O. Johnson, of Indianapolis, Ind.

Dr. Crouter, who is president of the association, is superintendent of the Pennsylvania Institution for the Deaf and Dumb at Mt. Airy, Philadelphia. Dr. Bell founded the association in 1890, and has endowed it with gifts, amounting to \$100,000. The Mt. Airy institution will play a prominent part in the proceedings.

**THE FRUIT INSPECTOR**

P. H. Dickinson, of La Grande, county fruit inspector, was around among the growers of Union last Friday, and found our orchards generally in good condition. He urges the importance of spraying until September 1st and cautions the growers and dealers against the marketing of infected fruit of any kind. **GETS \$2,000 FOR SHOPPING MONEY**

New York, Aug. 24.—Abraham White, who is said to have made \$2,000,000 last week plunging on the long side of the Harriman stocks and with part of his winnings bought the late John A. McCall's estate at West End Long Branch, made another coup yesterday and immediately went up town with his wife to spend his winnings.

On Monday, White went to the office of his brokers.

"Mrs. White needs about \$5000 shopping money," he said, "and there is no reason why I should not get it out of Wall Street."

Great Northern preferred came out on the ticker at 305. "That looks cheap. I think I'll get some of that," he said. He took 500 shares at 305 and 500 Northern Pacific at 210.

Early in the afternoon, Mrs. White arrived at her husband's office prepared to go shopping. White asked her to wait a few minutes, closed out 600 Great Northern at 322 and 500 Northern Pacific at 218, netting him a total of \$12,000.

**PLAN NEW MILITARY HOSPITAL**

(Scrapps News Association)  
Washington, D. C., August 25.—The War Department is preparing to build near this city, on Brightwood Road, within the District limits, a large army general hospital, which will be the best equipped institution of its kind in the world. For months the army surgeons have been engaged in looking up literature on the subject and inspecting hospitals in all parts of the country. They also obtained much information from abroad. The best ideas which prevail anywhere will be used in the new hospital, which will cost a little less than \$500,000. To this institution army officers and enlisted men from all parts of the country and the Philippines will be sent when they are in need of special treatment. There is a general hospital now at Washington barracks, but it is not up to date and is not large to meet all the demands on it.

The equipment of the hospital will include a large number of appliances and apparatus of the most modern pattern, which, as a is only found in some of the best equipped special hospitals in this country and Europe.

**SEPTIC TANK WRECKED**

The septic tank of the city sewer system caved in some time during Monday night, caused by faulty construction and poor foundation.

The east side wall fell out and the roof of the east end fell in, demolishing the plant to a considerable extent.

The mayor and sewer committee have purchased a carload of cement and are in telephonic connection with a cement man and an effort will be made to repair the tank immediately. The tank cost about \$2500 and cracked before it was completed and has been a source of apprehensiveness ever since.—Ashland Record.
