The advantage of supporting home industries is plainly exemplified in the barber's trade. You cannot send away for a shave or a hair cut. As a result, today there are fourteen barbers employed in the five shops in this city, ten of whom have families. A moment's reflection will be sufficient to substantiate the statement that if the La Grande smokers were as loyal to the La Grande cigar factories as they are to the La Grande barbers, there would be at least twenty-five cigar makers steadily employed in this city.

We must cultivate the habit of patronizing home industry, and in return for this royalty the producers should be as loyal in producing just as meritorious an article or production as can be secured elsewhere. These two ideas working in harmony along all lines of trade cannot help but build up a strong, live prosperous community wherever practiced. Let us get the habit in La Grande.
