IN MEMORY OF WILLIAM CONWAY

Camden, Me., Aug. 30—This is the day set for unveiling the tablet in honor of Wm. Conway, the sailor in the United States Navy, who at the breaking out of the Civil War refused to haul down the American flag at the Pensacola Navy Yard, when the officers there renounced their allegiance to the Union. The presence of the North Atlantic squadron under the command of Rear Admiral Robly D. Evans, in the harbor is lending unusual dignity to the event and has attracted thousands of visitors from all parts of the state.

The formal exercises in connection with the celebration will be held at two o'clock this afternoon at Camden Trotting Park, where seats have been arranged for about two thousand persons. The exercises at the park will be brief. The meeting will be called to order by Thomas A. Hunt who will deliver an address of welcome, after the Rev. Dr. J. S. Sewall, of Bangor, the chaplain of the Commandery of the Loyal Legion, has delivered the opening prayer. Other brief addresses by Governor Cobb and others will follow. A letter from President Roosevelt will be read. Music and singing will fill the rest of the program.

After these exercises Major T. Richards, Commander of the Maine Commandery of the Loyal Legion will unveil the bronze tablet donated jointly by the people of Camden.

FRUIT PACKERS NEED

NOT GO TO SCHOOL

The scarcity of packers to handle the prune crop at the packing houses of this city is still bothering commission men, and efforts have been made this week to have the opening of school postponed a week until the bulk of the crop has been disposed of. This plan was unsuccessful and the schools will open on Monday, September 3, as announced.

The proprietors of the produce houses have gained one point, however, which will materially aid them in their time of trouble. All students of school age, who come under the jurisdiction of the truant officer will be permitted to remain away from their studies for the purpose of packing fruit if their parents offer no objections. There is a large number of employes engaged at the Walla Walla Produce house this week, but the prunes are pouring in so fast that it is almost impossible with the present force to keep up with the supply.—Walla Walla Union.

The Sumpter valley railroad has filed a petition to the county board of equalization asking that the assessment of the road property be lowered from the figure used this year to what it was two years ago. In the petition Superintendent Barton sets forth the fact that the road is a small one and that since extending beyond Sumpter the additional mileage has not paid the cost of operation. Mr. Barton shows that the road is non-productive beyond Sumpter and that it is opening up a new country and should not be so heavily taxed while engaged in the work of opening up new territory which will benefit Baker City as much as the owners of the road, providing it ever benefits the owners of the road.—Pendleton E.
