DIETRICH FAMILY REUNION

 Kutztown, Pa., Sept. 1—Hundreds of members of the Dietrich family are in attendance at the annual reunion of the Dietrich family at Kutztown Park today. This is the third reunion of the family which numbers more than 5,000 members who are scattered through every state and territory in the Union. Some thirty-six members of the Dietrich family, which traces its history back to Dietrich, Bern, King of the Osage in Southern Europe from 482 to 526 A. D., came across the sea between 1751 and 1775 and became scattered through the country.

The three packing houses are busy now handling the prune crop. About four cars, averaging 1000 crates per car, are shipped daily. Saturday was the banner day seven carloads being shipped on that date. It requires 140 packers to prepare the fruit for shipment, and they earn from \$1 to \$5 per day.—Milton Eagle.

WHY PHYSICIAN USE LATIN
 (Literary Digest)

The use of Latin by physicians in prescription writing is commonly regarded as a harmless survival of medievalism. Occasionally a lay writer suggests its abandonment. In commenting on a recent note to this effect in a daily paper, which advocates the compulsory use of English in prescriptions, the Druggist's Circular and Chemical Gazette takes occasion to make a strong defense of the time-honored practice. Says this paper: "Suppose the sapient writer quoted whose utterances may sound all right to those who know no more of its subjects than he does, should fall sick and his physician should decide that the one thing needful to save his life was geranium robertianum. If there were a law preventing the doctor from prescribing in Latin he would have to choose one of the upward of a dozen English names for this. Suppose he choose 'redshanks' and so wrote the word in his prescription. When the druggist went to prepare the medicine he would find that 'redshanks' was the English name of at least four entirely different plants, namely, the one already mentioned, polygonum amphibium, polygonum persicaria and rumex acetosa.
