TO CHANGE THE CONSTITUTION

(Scrapps News Association) Des Moines Sept. 4—The interstate conference called by Governor Cummins of this State for the purpose of considering and discussing the proposition of calling a national constitutional convention with a view of so changing the Constitution of the United States that it shall provide for the election of United States senators by popular vote, opened its session here today.

Governor Cummins who is personally taking great interest in the matter is presiding at the conference which promises to be of great political importance. It may result in completely overriding the Senate of the United States and in establishing a new method of choosing Senators in spite of the opposition of the United States Senate

BORROWS MONEY FOR MANCHURIA

(Scrapps News Association) Tokio, Sept. 5—M. Takahisi, vice governor of the Bank of Japan, started today for England and the United States for the purpose of negotiating a government loan of \$40,000,000 for Manchurian enterprises. If the circumstances are favorable he will also negotiate for the replacing of old loans by new ones at a lower rate of interest.

(Scrapps News Association) Syracuse, N. Y., September 5.—The annual convention of the Liquor Dealers' Association of the State of New York, which opened here yesterday informally, held its first regular business session here today.

The Constitution Article 5 provides that on the application the legislature of two thirds of the several states Congress shall call a convention for proposing amendments to the constitution and these shall become valid when they shall be ratified by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states or by conventions in three-fourths thereof.

Thirty-two state legislatures have at different times signified to Congress their desire that steps be taken to amend the Constitution and provide for the popular election of Senators. But this is not strong enough; the legislatures must apply to and practically demand of Congress that a constitutional convention be called and then Congress will have no option in the matter, but will be forced to grant the request.

TELEPHONE MEN HOLD CONVENTION

(Scrapps News Association) Toronto, Ont., Sept. 5—The Canadian Independent Telephone Association is holding its annual convention at the City Hall here today. The attendance is unusually large and nearly every independent telephone company in the Dominion is represented by delegates.

The present war among telephone companies in New Brunswick and the recent wars in Quebec, Ontario and the West have made the telephone matter one of the most important public questions of the year.

RACING FOG THE ROOSEVELT CUP

(Scrapps News Association) Marblehead, Mass., September 5.—The second in the series of five international races between three American and three German yachts, competing for the Roosevelt Cup, is being sailed today off this harbor and a large number of yachts and steamers loaded with spectators, are swarming outside of the picket line of lances, stationed on the outskirts of the sailing course to prevent any interference with the competing yachts.
