CHEAP PAINT

The Scientific American gives this recipe for a cheap and durable paint for farm buildings: "Stir into a gallon of milk about three pounds of Portland cement, and add sufficient Venetian red, or any other colored paint powder to give a good color. The milk will hold the powder in solution, but the cement, being heavy, will sink to the bottom. So it is necessary to keep the mixture well stirred up with a paddle while applying it; and, as its efficiency depends upon administering a good coating of cement, it is not safe to trust its application to untrustworthy hands. Six hours after applying, this paint will be immovable and unaffected by water as a smooth-oid paint. We have known of buildings twenty years old in which the wood is well preserved by it."

OREGON ROADS

There are 24,258 miles of public road in the state of Oregon, of which 2255 miles are surfaced with gravel, 209 miles with stone and 145 miles with plank making a total of 2589 miles of improved road.

It will be seen from these figures that about 7 1/2 per cent of the roads have been improved. By comparing the total road mileage with the area of the state it appears that there was about 36-100 of a mile of public road per square mile of area.

A comparison of mileage with population shows that there was one mile of road to every 12 inhabitants, but only one mile of improved road to every 150 inhabitants.

Prohibition is the leading issue in the Maine election today. Maine has been nominally a prohibition state for half a century and naturally the entire country is more or less interested in the outcome of today's election, as it will show the trend of public opinion on this great question.

Today our public schools in this city opened as well as in many other districts. Union county is certainly very liberal in the matter of schools. Last year over \$100,000 was paid out for the education of our children, of this amount \$43,000 was paid to teachers. Quite a payroll in itself.
