ANOTHER NEW PEACE PRESERVER

Brooklyn, N. Y., Sept. 21.—The battleship Connecticut which was built in the Brooklyn Navy Yard and was floated a few days ago after having received its final coat of paint in the dry dock, is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready to go into commission on September 29. The various tests to which the battleship was submitted gave the most satisfactory results and the naval authorities are well pleased with the behavior of the ship under various trying conditions.
Captain William Swift is the commander of the Connecticut, and Lieutenant Commander William R. Shoemaker is her executive officer. The ship will carry eight hundred men. She carries twelve seven inch guns in her main battery, in addition to the turret guns. The last of these guns was put in position a few days ago, so that the main battery of the battleship is now complete.

THERE WILL BE NO CONTEST

New York, Sept. 21.—The will of the late multi-millionaire, Russell Sage, was submitted to probate without contest. Under the settlement twenty-five nieces and nephews who were left \$25,000 under the will are to receive \$50,000 each, while the minor heir Edson T. Conrad of Waterville will receive \$12,500. Senator Bracken had intended to begin a contest on behalf of young Conrad.
The attorneys of Mrs. Sage announce that the widow intends as she qualifies as executrix, to give each beneficiary an additional amount equal to the amount bequeathed.

A GREAT MEETING
Spokane, Washington, September 21.—Railroads of the four Pacific Northwest states are giving every assistance possible to make the convention of commercial clubs, which is to be held in Spokane September 25 and 26, one of far-reaching importance. The Union Pacific system, including the O. R. & N. lines, the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern all are making a one fare rate for the round trip to Spokane from every point in the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana. Most of the commercial clubs also are responding sending word that they will be represented at Spokane.

FEWER HORSES AND PIGS
(Scripps News Association)
London, September 21.—Official returns prepared by the Board of Agriculture show that of a total area of land and water of 56,788,366 acres of Great Britain 32,266,790 acres were under crops and grass on June 4 last, a decrease of 20,043 acres, as compared with the same date last year. The orchard acreage 247,684, showed an increase of 3,364 acres. The total number of horses on the date named was 1,568,681, a decrease of 3,752. Cattle, 7,010,856, showed a slight increase, as did the sheep, 25,420,370, but there were 101,450 fewer pigs.
The general conditions of agriculture during the year ending on June 4 last were unusually satisfactory and the farming population enjoyed a good average share of prosperity.

RAILROAD ASSESSMENTS
Baker's county court after considering the assessment of the O. R. & N. property fixed it at \$12,000 per mile for road bed and \$1,000 per mile on rolling stock.
In its study of conditions the court found various valuations fixed over the state upon the railroad property. In Wasco county on a 50 per cent valuation the O. R. & N. was paying on \$10,000 per mile in Marion county on full valuation it was paying on \$17,000; in Multnomah on 75 per cent valuation it was paying on \$17,444 Union county had a 50 per cent valuation listed at \$8250 per mile in Umatilla a 33 1/2 per cent valuation was \$1,000 per mile.

MATCH TRUST IS GROWING

San Francisco, Sept. 21.—A representative of the Diamond Match Company sailed today for Japan, to carry out the arrangements under the compact which has been signed between the Japanese Government, the American Match Trust and the English Match Concern of Bryant & May. Japan has been nursing the match industry and now supplies all her own requirements, and also controls the trade in China, Australia, parts of the East Indies and the Philippine Islands. Japan wants to acquire the latest machinery and for that reason has entered into the union with the American trust.
