MONEY IN MULES

W. R. Ledbetter of Alice was a La Grande visitor this morning. Mr. Ledbetter, states that his experience in the mule business in this valley leads him to wonder why more Union county farmers do not engage in mule raising. He says there is already a market for all the mules that can be produced in this valley.

According to Mr. Ledbetter a mule is old enough to wean can be sold for forty-five dollars and when it is two years old will find a ready sale at from one hundred to hundred and twenty-five dollars. He says that a mule can be brought to maturity at a less expense than a horse, and that the market is more sure. Mr. Ledbetter now has about seventy mules on the range. Last year he sold something like a hundred to persons in Walla Walla. According to Mr. Ledbetter there is double the money in mules than there is in horses.
