Japan is reported to have announced its decision to hold in the near future an international exhibition. There have also been reports of a proposed fair at Barcelona, Spain. The Jamestown Exhibition of 1907 will hardly be an old story before another great fair is opened in some part of the world.

Bodies of the pauper dead in the District of Columbia are not to be buried in the potter's field, but are to be cremated, for Congress has appropriated fifteen thousand dollars for building a suitable crematory. Objection to cremation is heard less frequently than it was a generation ago, possibly because the people have begun to understand that incineration is only a quickening of the natural process that goes on in the ground.

An appeal has been made by a correspondent of a London newspaper for the raising of a fund to repair and preserve the cottage at Elstow, near Bedford, England, in which John Bunyan began his married life. The correspondent says that the building is now in such a dilapidated condition that it is likely to collapse at any time. If every one who has read "Pilgrims Progress" would contribute a sum commensurate with the benefits received, the old house might be made into a "cottage" as good as those at Newport.

The Washington state Republican convention passed a resolution declaring their preference for President Roosevelt as their standard bearer in 1908. Other states will undoubtedly pass a similar resolution before presidential nominations are made. Roosevelt undoubtedly thinks he has served his country sufficient and desires to retire but when the people commence to realize the possibility of losing such a noble and able executive they will rise in mass and make their desire so strong that a negative answer will not be possible.

Both political parties in the state of Idaho in their platforms declare for a primary law, similar to Oregon's. Idaho is too progressive a state not to adopt any and everything that stands for the purity of the ballot. Oregon is more than pleased with the new law and it is now permanent. Our last primary election demonstrated that the over man has just as good a chance for the political prefer-

ment as the rich. It also demonstrated, that the fact that if a man was rich, provided that he also had ability of the right kind, also had a chance. Oregon's primary law will rapidly be the model for all progressive states.

The policy adopted by the railroads within the next few years will depend largely whether or not this country will try government ownership. There will be a change in the management of these great common carriers and the public mind is developing rapidly along these lines. There is a large independent vote that is critically watching the trend of the times and the Interstate Commerce Commission and the federal courts bring about radical changes in the present day management of the railroads. Government ownership is a long ways off. If on the other hand roads thro a policy tenaciously cling to present methods and refuse to adjust inequalities and discrimination. Government ownership will be crowded upon us, sooner perhaps than we are ready for it.
