JASEN LEE ACADEMY OPENED

Jason Lee Academy of Weiser which now belongs to the Idaho Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church was opened Sept. 25, with interesting and impressive exercises. The entire board of trustees, with one exception was present as follows:

Rev. J. D. Gillilan, Rev. B. F. Meredith G. H. Currey, of La Grande; Rev. G. W. Barnes, Boise; Rev. J. H. Ross, Mendian; Mayor Ross Madden, Caldwell; Hon. B. L. Steeves and F. S. Harding of Weiser. Besides the above a number of the ladies of Weiser attended the exercises. Short addresses were made by all the trustees and several of the ladies present. Mr. Meredith who spent several weeks in the field reported that about \$1000 subscribed on current expenses for this year. The plans to erect a memorial building with endowment to Jason Lee meets with general favor. About \$12,000 has already been promised for the endowment fund of \$100,000. The school opens with an enrollment of 14 which is considered a favorable showing considering the lateness of the season when the Methodists got control. Pres. J. C. Teeters made a good impression on those present. He is an experienced administrator and teacher. Prof. Ludwig Thomsen, who had change of the Academy last year, will serve as principal this year. He is a congregational minister with rare ability as an instructor. Miss Bertha Andrew-artha of Boise, a graduate of Willamette school of music has charge of the musical department. At the meeting of the trustees Mr. H. E. Neal of Boise was elected to fill the vacancy of Mrs. B. C. Henderson, who resigned. It was decided if possible to put some one in the field permanently for the purpose of raising the endowment fund.
