ADOPTING NEW DEVICE

J. Smith, the bicycle repairer is today experimenting with and adjusting the new device that will be used on passenger engines if the machine which he now has in hand proves successful.

It is the intention of the O. R. & N. company to equip its passenger engines with bicycles having railroad track attachments. These machines are to be used in case a train is flagged by the block system. Prior to this, in such cases the brakeman walks on ahead of the train and "flags" thru the block, until the obstacle is met.

With the advent of the railroad bicycle, the brakeman simply has to take a high grade wheel from its hangings on the engine and ride thru thus doing away with a great loss of time.

There is a guiding pulley fore and aft of the wheel proper and a third pulley keeps the bicycle on the track. Mr. Smith will have the initial machine adjusted today and if practical, the O. R. & N. will equip all its passenger engines with this device.

MORRISTOWN HORSE SHOW

Morristown N. J., Oct. 4.—The Morristown Field Club opened its ninth annual horse show today. The exhibition will continue until Saturday. The entries are large and are divided into thirty classes, including classes for roadsters, harness horses, tandems, four-in-hands, saddle horses, ponies and jumpers. There are in addition to the previously named eight-een events only open to amateur owners of horses residing in Morris and Somerset counties. Dealers are barred. Some of the contestants call for ladies to ride or drive, which is always one of the attractive features of the Morristown show.
