An experiment tried on a farm in England recently shows that fields can be so illuminated by acetylene gas that harvesting may be easily carried on at night. In the test made two mowers, each cutting a six-foot swath, were employed in a field of fifteen acres, which was mowed in three hours and thirty-five minutes. The power was furnished by a gasoline traction engine.

The Chicago Chronicle, delving in court statistics, finds that in the ten years between 1890 and 1900 the English courts of review granted new trials in less than 3 1/2 per cent of the cases brot to their attention. In the United States during the same period it is estimated that 46 per cent of all cases appealed were sent to new trial, and that in 60 per cent of these the appeal turned upon points of pleading and practice—in other words, pure technicalities.
