NOTICE OF PROPOSED SIDE-WALK CONSTRUCTION

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, held on Oct. 3, 1906, a resolution was passed providing for a 7 foot sidewalk along and upon the east side of Jackson avenue from its intersection with North 4th street to its intersection with North Depot street, that unless said side walk improvement is defeated by a remonstrance signed by at least two thirds of the abutting property owners and filed with the city Recorder within 10 days of this notice, the said side-walk will be ordered constructed by the council of said city.
