## N. Y. CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR

Bklyn, N. Y., Oct. 9—In the LaFayette Avenue Presbyterian church here today the nineteenth annual convention of the New York State Christian Endeavor Union was commenced, when representatives of the 2500 societies of the state, to the number of 2000 attended. A notable figure at the convention was the Rev. Francis E. Clark, D. D. L. S. D., the founder of the Christian Endeavor movement. The other speakers were the Rev. Dr. R. A. Torre and Chas. Alexander, who together have been around the world in one of the most noted evangelistic campaigns in history; Rev. Dr. Len G. Broughton of Atlanta, Ga., the most famous Baptist minister of the south; Rev. Dr. I. Vance of Newark, N. J., famous in the ranks of the Dutch Reformed church; Dr. Wm. Patterson pastor of the Bethany Presbyterian church; Dr. Edwin Farrest Hallenbeck; Professor A. R. Wells, editor "Christian Endeavor Work," who in his time has written 30 works on Christian Endeavor work, and Giosy Smith of the great English evangelist. During the proceedings Mr. Ira D. Sankey put in an appearance and was very cordially greeted. The song leader at the convention is the Rev. H. Jacots, who has already had charge of large choruses in connection with Denver and Baltimore international gatherings, while Mr. Chas. Alexander, Mr. Torrey's song leader also helped.

The convention will last until the 11, is considered to be the most important of its kind.

In the letter the parents say that a man living near Touchet, Washington, was recently told something regarding the case by an Indian named Winnistor, who lives near Adams. Knowing that Major Moorhouse, thru the friendship that exists between himself and the Indians, would be able to learn the truth of the story, the grief-stricken parents decided to ask his aid.

Major Moorhouse says he will learn what he can from the Indians regarding the story that has been circulated, but he fears there is little foundation for it. However, as many Indians were in the mountains at the time of the boy's strange disappearance, it may be that some of the tribe know something about the case.

## SARAH A. BERRY

Mrs. Sarah A. Berry, nee King, died at her home in Imbler last Saturday evening, aged 71 years.

Sarah King was born June 4, 1835, in Arkansas. In that state she spent her childhood. In '48 she was united in marriage to Wm. Berry and a few years later they started for the west coming to this country in the early seventies, and resided here continuously up to the time of her death. Thus she spent many years in the Grande Ronde, during which time she invariably made friends of all who came in contact with her. Mr. Berry has been dead a year and a half. Interment was made yesterday in the Summerville cemetery.

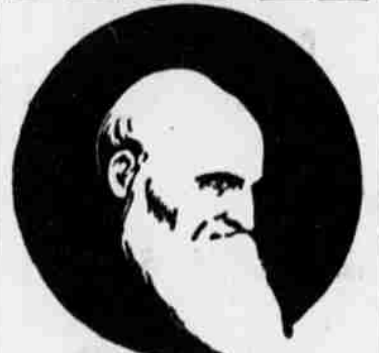
