CITIZENS UNITE WITH POLICE TO RID CITY OF THUGS

One Element Favors Lynching of all Thugs who are Caught Stealing, Robbing and Menacing Human Life; San Francisco is in Epoch of Terror.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—The preliminary mass meetings of the citizens of this city this afternoon to form a public safety committee met this morning to select a chairman whose duties will be named by a committee of a hundred citizens.

The plan in general was also discussed and acting Mayor Gallagher's position considered, the mayor having declared that he should not permit a committee to usurp the police powers. There seems

to be a division in sentiment among the leaders of the movement for advocating vigorous measures, which some affect to believe means lynching of thugs when caught, while others take the stand that coalition with the police can be safely predicted. However the latter plan will win as only a very small minority favors the vigilante organizations, such as ruled and cleaned up the city as in days of old. Officers of financial aid in ridding the city of the thugs that in infest it are coming from all parts of the state.

BARRICADE ENGLISH PORTLAND TEACHERS WHARVES TO COME

NEW CALIFORNIA LINES

Oakland Cal., Oct. 13.—The Central California has been incorporated by the Southern Pacific. It will extend from miles on the latter's main line to Dunbarton Point thru Redwood City, San Mateo and on to San Francisco, along the new Bay-shore cut off. Transcontinental passenger trains will use this routed via the Dunbarton Point bridge and into the heart of San Francisco. The main use the line will be for freight now ferried over the bay from Oakland.

WESTERN FREIGHT RATES LOWERED

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 13.—The 25 per cent reduction in its tariff on commodities shipped under refrigeration which the Southern Pacific commenced on Wednesday last will have the effect of much larger shipments of fruit from California and cheaper prices in the eastern States. Larger shipments of other perishable commodities will also be encouraged by the Southern Pacific.

New York, Oct. 13.—Mr. Alfred Mosely, the English educationalist who sent a commission of Englishmen interested in education to America in 1905, will arrive here in a few days with 500 teachers of English schools. A committee leader, Mr. Straubermuller, of the Department of Education has prepared a classification of the public schools in the country in order to make it possible for the visitors to see the kind of school in which he or she is most interested. All parts of the United States will be visited.

RAILROAD CLERKS STRIKE

El Paso Texas Oct. 13.—Every member of the Brotherhood of Railway clerks of the Atlantic and Southern Pacific systems from El Paso to New Orleans went on a strike this morning. The clerks demand an increase of ten per cent in wages, pay over time, and recognition of the order.

STILL ANOTHER INSURRECTION

Washington, Oct. 13.—Commander Southerland cables to the United States government that another insurrection has started in San Domingo. Five hundred insurgents are massed outside of the capital.

MINING ACTIVITY IN NEVADA

Virginia City, Oct. 13.—Probably never before in the history of this new mining state has there been so much booming and excitement. New mines are daily opening up. The Greenwater Red Bay Copper Co. which offered 250,000 treasury shares had them over subscribed to the amount of 600,000 shares, and in several other cases shares have been over subscribed largely.

Three new claims in the district have been incorporated as the Goldfield Silver Peak Mining Co and have been prospected sufficiently to disclose a well defined knowledge in a formation of granite, chest and porphyry. Values have been found as high as from \$50 to \$300 a ton. The shaft on the lead vein is down 150 feet the ledge maintaining its width of two feet. The ore assays 74 per cent lead—about same as above—but the silver values have increased to 20 ounces to the ton. On another new claim a shaft down fifteen feet in a gold bearing ledge has opened a vein several feet wide with assays running as high as \$500 to the ton.

THE WHEAT CROP OF CANADA

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 13.—After careful inquiry Premier R. P. Rabin, of Manitoba has estimated that the Canadian North West has raised a wheat crop this year of 120,000,000 bushels making the quantity slightly above the average.

Kansas City, Oct. 13.—Judge Woodford for twenty years a criminal judge, this morning while sentencing a prisoner for burglary, said: "You are what is called an under dog. With this peculiar parting remark the prisoner was lead away while the judge turned to the next criminal in the line.

MURDER AND SUICIDE

Teuplo, Miss., Oct. 13.—After cutting his wife's throat from ear to ear, G. W. Campbell committed suicide in the same way this morning in the hotel here. No reason for the terrible act has been found.

NO CITY POUND

In the circuit court yesterday afternoon in the case of C. C. Frasier vs Ed Harding, city pound master, the court held that owing to the fact that the supposed city pound was not designated as per the city charter, legally the city did not have a pound and took the case away from the jury and directed it to bring in a verdict for the plaintiff and for \$90 damages. The cause of action was based on the fact that the city impounded several head of horses, the property of Mr. Frasier.

As a result of having no pound, Poundmaster Harding today filed complaint against Peter Jacobs, James Ireland and W. K. Davis under the city ordinances for permitting stock to run at large. This is more expensive than the former system and owners of stock will save trouble by keeping their stock up.

GATHERING OF ODD FELLOWS

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 13.—One of the greatest reunions of Odd Fellows in the United States took place in the Opera House here tonight the occasion being the production of the dramatized degrees of Odd Fellowship by the Oak Cliff Degree Staff. Great interest was centered in the proceedings and delegates from every state in the union attended.

Amongst those present from other states were team captains and those most prominent in the development of the ritualistic work of the order. The production was the final result of three years efforts in the finished dramatization of the four degrees of the subordinate lodge of Odd Fellowship and was the first of its kind ever presented in the United States. The proceedings were highly successful.

MEXICAN LEADERS ARRESTED

Chicago, Oct. 13.—Offers from outside cities for the seventh game in the world championship series have been declined by the National baseball commission.

The balmy sunshiny weather and the half holiday that has been declared in the city, has caused an increase in attendance. Rooters are carrying all sorts of noise makers.

At one thirty the gates were closed with 10,000 fans standing on the outside unable to gain admission. Twenty-five thousand were on the inside. By the time the game started there were fifteen thousand people lined up on the gates. A roar from the rooters drowned all other sounds as the board of trade rooters led a pair of live cubs on the grounds. Tannehill went in at short, but was later replaced by Davis. Rohé is at third. As the cubs entered the field they led a pair of black bears, snapping and snarling amusingly.

TAFT, BACON AND FUNSTON LEAVE CUBA FOR AMERICA

SAVING FALLEN TIMBER

As the fallen timber should be cut before it gets eaten with worms it is probable that much of it will be floated down the streams and shipped to Europe as hewn lumber as the local mills cannot saw or handle all of it.
