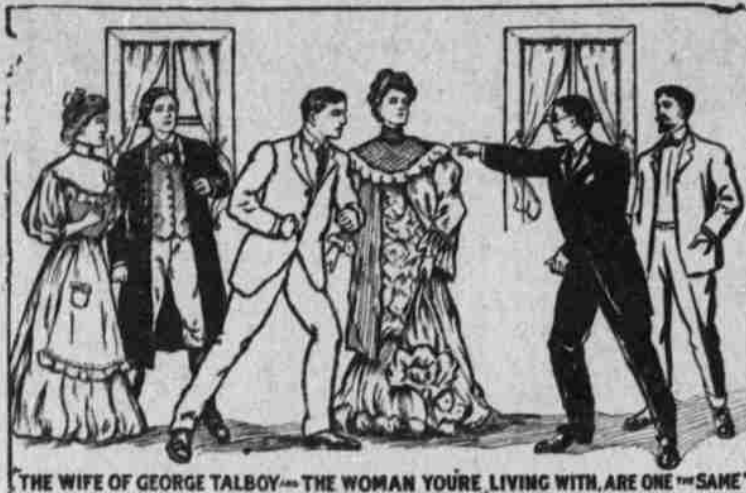


# At The Theatre
