LA GRANDE BOY MAKES FINE SHOWING IN PRACTICE GAME

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon, October 15, 1906.

On Saturday October 13, at three thirty p. m. a game of football was played on Kincaid Field between the Varsity eleven and the second team of the U. of O. The game was very closely contested and the final score of 25 to 0 tells only part of the story.

Several times the plucky little "scrubs" stood a good show of making a touchdown but the weight and experience of the other team turned the tide. This game was largely in the nature of a tryout to

decide what men will play in the game here the 20th inst. against the Astoria Athletic Club. Among those who did noticeably fine work was Groux of La Grande, who played center on the second team and Kent Gilles, the big man from Baker City, busy all the time. The contest was clean and while desperately fought, no one was injured. A large crowd witnessed the game and rooting was vigorous. A picturesque group of the "plug-uglies" shouted for the second team. From the quality of work done, competent judges believe that the Oregon team will again win the college championship of the northwest.

HIMES IN WALLA WALLA

George H. Himes, Secretary of the Oregon Historical Society, is in the city gathering material for a comprehensive biography of the early settlers of the northwest, says the Walla Walla Statesman. The records of the pioneer experience of 15,000 have already been collected by this society which plans a big card index of the early settlers.

Mr. Himes was much pleased with the success of Ezra Meeker in recrossing the old Oregon Trail.

"They thought the old man was too old to do it," he said, "but he was sturdy. I think that the publicity given his trip will result in the government having the trail properly marked. There is no such achievement in all history as that where a people went into a trackless wilderness in such numbers for 2000 miles to make permanent homes."

Mr. Himes will be in the city several days interviewing old settlers and collecting data for the great pioneer encyclopedia.
