## WOMEN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY CONVENTION

The 14th annual meeting of the Columbia River Branch of the W. F. M. Society of the M. E. church, which convened Friday morning at Walla Walla in Wilbur Memorial church was one of much inspiration and cause for deep thought.

At the close of the prayer meeting Thursday evening led by the pastor Rev. Robert Reid, an informal meeting of the delegates present was held.

To speak of all the good things that were crowded into those three days would make this article much too long.

About 50 delegates, were in attendance during the session, including four foreign missionaries who are visiting the homeland, and many others.

The tediousness of the business sessions was greatly relieved by beautiful songs.

#### FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Memorial service for members who had died during the past year was conducted by Mrs. M. M. Marvin.

The Young People's Rally in the evening was most inspiring.

First thing was a march through the aisles, of eighteen or twenty Standard Bearer girls, with their white banners, with blue crosses over their shoulders, as their sweet young voices floated out over the audience in "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Prayer was offered by Gabriel Sykes. The 24th Psalm was read, then the "Glory" song thrilled all present. The remainder of the evening was filled in with helpful papers on the duty of a president, secretary and treasurer. Little Esther McDonald sang very sweetly, "Breathe on Me." Rev. and Mrs. Van Dyke gave very good and interesting talks, and the evening closed with "Nearer My God to Thee." Mrs. E. E. Upmeyer, branch superintendent of Young People's work, presided.

#### SATURDAY FORENOON

Election of officers and delegates to the general executive meeting, resulted in the following:

Upmeyer, Harisburg, Oregon; superintendent Mission Box, Mrs. Thad Austin; delegates, Mrs. Mathew and Mrs. Beharal.

Children's hour in the afternoon was quite interesting, when the little ones came to the front and were taught the "King's Herald's Yell."

Next, Mrs. Marlott from Tacoma gave a most interesting talk. She said that "Christ alone can save this world, but Christ can not save this world alone."

We must help. If all the people who die in one day throughout the world were buried in rows across these United States there would be seven rows from sea to sea. Enough to make five cities the size of Walla Walla. And we don't seem to care. About one to every 2000 of the membership of the M. E. church becomes a missionary." She had 128 yards of braid looped around the room which represented the wealth of Protestants and a tiny piece almost too small to be seen in the audience that represented the amount given to Missions. Her figures showed \$250,000,000 spent annually for tobacco, \$5,400,000,000 for amusements. "O, how much it takes to amuse us." For candy \$178,000,000, chewing gum \$11,000,000, foreign missions \$7,500,000.

In the president's speech on Friday, she said, in reference to the death of Mrs. Whitney the Branch treasurer, "I through the cloud I can say I am thankful that the Lord ever gave us such women," in speaking of the heathen woman she said, "These hands stretched out over there to us, we are responsible, wonderfully so for the work over there. God died to save the world, not only one part of it. If we spend our whole time on our homes, we grow selfish and spoil our children, better give them something to do with us. We must make this year a campaign for members. Let us double our membership not approximate it, but do it. We do so much every day that will not abide. Let us lay up some treasure that will abide." She also said "I first went to China 16 years ago, and if I could spend 20 more years there, I would be the happiest woman in the world."
