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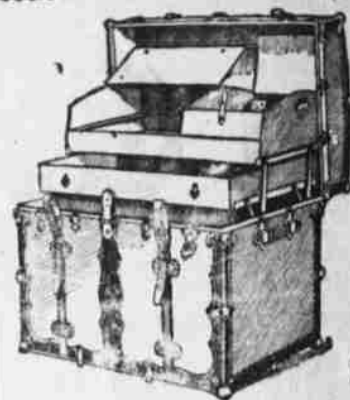

The pleasant weather of the Pacific Coast is quite a contrast from the violent snow storms of the Atlantic coast. Taking it all in all the Oregon people have nothing to complain of in weather conditions. The Willamette valley is a little rainy, to be sure, and Eastern Oregon is a little snowy at times, but it is nothing besides the disagreeable features of the Atlantic or Middle West states.

According to the semi-annual statement published in the last issue of the Blue Mountain Eagle the indebtedness of Grant county is \$105,829.90. There is outstanding warrants to the amount of \$107,515.57, with interest accrued thereon to the amount of \$19,260, making a total indebtedness of \$126,775.51. There is \$10,945.61 cash on hand and back taxes to the amount of \$10,000, making a total of resources of \$50,645.61, leaving the actual indebtedness \$105,929.90.
