OREGON'S WOOL CROP STATISTICS

In his biennial report of the Oregon legislature, O. P. Hoff, commissioner of labor and commerce for the state will have the following of interest to wool growers:

Oregon this year ranks fifth in the wool producing states and the estimated output is between 19,000,000 and 20,000,000 pounds. The average price to the grower will be 19 cents per pound.

Eastern Oregon wools shrink about 69 per cent, while that from the Willamette valley shrink from 49 to 50 per cent, but Eastern Oregon wool is worth about 10 cents a pound more scoured. The coarser the wool the less the shrinkage. The several districts send in the following estimate of Oregon wool output of 1905.
