JAPANESE DIET PLANS EXTENSIVE EXPANSION

(Scripps News Association)
Yokohama, Oct. 26—The Diet today voted \$135,000,000 dollars for a programme of improvements of the navy, the extension to cover a period of eight years. \$12,000,000 of this sum will be used to repair present vessels among them being the former Russian vessels captured and raised. Many vessels in the service are now to be replaced. The new programme provides for a battleship Squadron of eight vessels representing the strongest and newest types, two armoured cruiser squadrons of four ships each. The government has now under construction, or about to be laid down, three battleships, nine armoured cruisers,

and the fast cruisers which will be added to the proposed programme. It is intended that two battleships shall be of the Satsuma and Aki class (now building) of 19,000 tons each and four of the Kashima and Rateri class of 15,500 tons. Of the captured battleships but two of the Oreo and Retyvian are considered competent to take place with the new style warships. The minister of the navy in demanding the appropriation said his opinion was that the naval policy should be based upon the national burdens, which were heavy already, of course, always arranging that the nations naval efficiency be not impaired.

DISTRIBUTIONS OF ALIENS

New York, Oct. 26—The distribution of aliens from this city by the southern states immigration commission is progressing rapidly. Upward of 2000 aliens have been sent South since the organization began its work in June last.
