It begins to look as tho under the new
apportionment that Union county will here-
after have two representatives. We
should have had all of the time.

It is estimated that the fruit crop of
Yakima county for the year 1906 will
bring \$750,000 to the valley, says the
Yakima Republic.

William R. Hearst publishes three
papers in New York and one each in Bos-
ton, Chicago and in San Francisco. He
started some ten years ago with the San
Francisco publication, the Examiner.

A prominent horticulturist made the
statement this morning that there would
be an unusually large acreage planted to
fruit this fall and next spring, principally
winter apples.

In four-fifths of the United States
birds with beautiful feathers have been
early exterminated. A lady in New York
has been seen wearing a cloak which cost
the lives of 8000 of those winged poems
of the air which we call humming birds.

This weather comes as a special dis-
pensation for the benefit of the sugar beet
and fruit growers and they are certainly
taking advantage of it. The beet sheds
at the sugar factory are being filled and
a few more days and the bulk of the ap-
ple crop of the valley will be gathered
and stored.

Eastern farmers are practically through
their season's work and hundreds are
touring the west with a view of changing
their locations. Those who were caught
in the recent snow storms of the middle
west were not prepared for such warm
and growing weather as now prevails all
over Eastern Oregon.

The benefit of the system in Washing-
ton as enjoyed by farmers is that the
price of grain bags during the present
year has been six and a half cents apiece,
while in Oregon it has been 11 and 12.
Men whose farms joined on the state line
between Oregon and Washington paid
these prices as they were on one side or
the other of this line.—Pendleton Tribune.

A drive among the orchards at this
time reveals actual conditions that must
be seen to be appreciated. On every
hand, where not gathered, the apple trees
are burdened with their weight of large
shiny red luscious fruit. Both size and

color are all that could be desired and the
prices offered are remunerative. A short
drive through May Park and Fruitdale
should be taken by every resident of this
city and vicinity. A personal tour of
inspection can only give one an idea of the
rapidly developing fruit industry of this
county.

Wednesday evening, the 31st of this
month, being Hallowe'en, the boys have
commenced already, and if their plans
carry out, from their stand point it will
be a success and the date will live in the
memory of not a few of our citizens, for
several weeks at least. Boys remember,
according to custom, you are granted
some few privileges out of the ordinary,
but you have no license to destroy prop-
erty. Arrests are not uncommon in some
portions of the country every Hallowe'en
but we trust that the telegraph wires will
not be burdened with messages telling
the world that the young people of La
Grande are law breakers. That is bad
advertising.

In order to ascertain how often and for
what a dollar is spent, a California so-
ciety is sending into circulation a hundred
silver dollars, each fastened to a parch-
ment tag. The person into whose hands
one of the dollars falls is requested to
write in blank spaces on the tag the date,
place and occasion of the transfer of the
coin to his possession, and then pass it
on in the course of ordinary business.
Ten coins will be sent out by each of sev-
eral trades and professions, bankers, ar-
tisans, retailers and so on. It is hoped
that the coins will be returned according
to directions, with all the blanks filled,
to the projectors of the scheme, and that
they may draw "practically scientific"
conclusions about the habits of American
purchasers. In school compositions "The
Autobiography of a Cent" used to be a
favorite subject, and those innocent fic-
tions are no doubt the progenitors of these
real travels of real dollars.

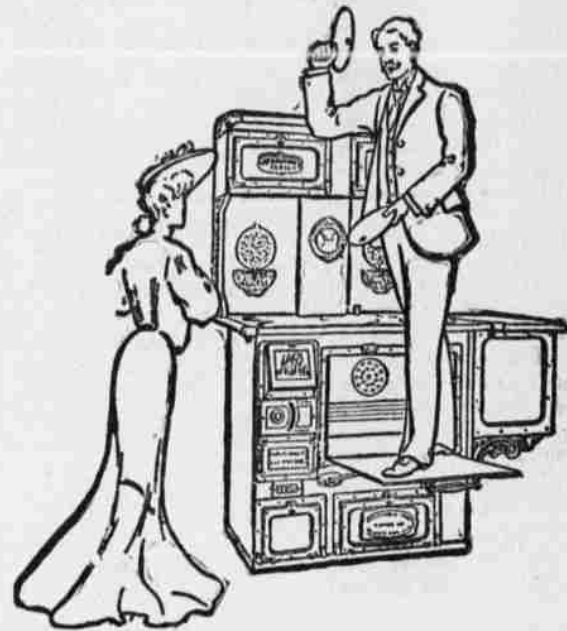
