Washington county is the only county in
the state where the three hundred dollar
exemption has been allowed, since the
supreme court declared the practice un-
constitutional.

On next Tuesday thirty-four states
hold their elections, but generally speak-
ing New York is about all the masses
are interested in, in other words the New
York campaign is the chief attraction on
the political board.

The paid-up capital of the chartered
banks of Canada increased during the six
months ending December 31, 1905, from
\$82,999,900, to \$85,294,210. The
bank deposits rose, during the same
period, from \$468,571,848 to \$512,227,
735.

It is most creditable to the Chicago
Tribune that it has handed over to credi-
tors of the wrecked Milwaukee Avenue
bank the \$5000 reward sent by the
Chicago Clearing House to its managing
editor, James Keeley, for arresting Stens-
and in Morocco. It has also released
the county from expenses, which amount
to \$5000. This act shows the spirit that
guides a great paper.

A number of our people are watching
with much interest the result of the
work now being done on the Aurelia
mine up Grande Ronde river and there
is every reason to believe that this mine
will not be a disappointment and that it
will be the means of other mills being
placed on other properties in that mineral
belt.

The protection of game in the State of
Oregon is costing the people of this state
in the neighborhood of \$30,000 a year.

Up to September 30 of the present
year the expenditures from the special
game fund for the protection of game
aggregated \$21,000. At the same rate
for the remainder of the year the total
of claims paid from that fund will be
\$28,000, to which must be added \$1700
salary and expenses of the Game and
Forestry Warden, making a total of
\$29,700 of visible expenses of game pro-
tection.

coast as well as the entire country has
always been over estimated.

The Colorado again flows to the sea,
the waters of the big river after many
months of emptying in the Salton sink
having been restrained by a concrete
constructed bank in place of the one
washed out nearly a mile long. Rock
and gravel in immense quantities were
filled in on the river side of the wall. It
cost the Southern Pacific railroad a million
dollars to turn the big river back and
send it on to the Gulf of California. But
it is a paying proposition, as five times in
two years the railroad was compelled to
move its track back from the encroach-
ing waters, lengthening the distance over
forty miles. Then \$25,000,000 in prop-
erty, the homes of ten thousand people
have been saved. Salt works that gave
the railroad thousands of carloads of
freight annually will again be able to
resume operations.

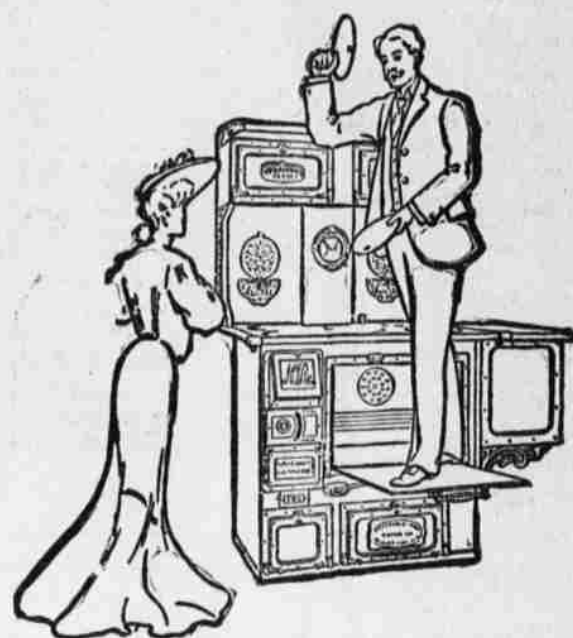
