THE GOLD OUTPUT INCREASES

(Scripps News Association)
New York Nov. 7.—The mint report on the world's gold production publishes today states that \$425,000,000 worth of precious basic metal was produced last year. The preceding year \$375,000,000 was the output. It is expected that next year's record will reach the half billion mark in sight-in fact will pass it if big developments that are expected in Africa and Alaska come off. Africa's production is increasing at an immense rate and Alaska possibilities have not been scratched on the surface. Placer mining is being replaced by the great machinery which invention has provided for exacting the last grain of gold. It is freely predicted that Alaska will one day surpass the Rand, which is at present the greatest producing gold field. Now comes the news from explorers and scientists that South America is the richest country in the world in gold. Its production is almost negligible today, but in the coming generation it will be made once more as it was in the days of the Montezumas, the world's greatest source of gold supply.

In the United States, Nevada, California and Idaho are, in order the centres of greatest development and promise at present. With modern methods the old California fields are being worked over again with better returns than before.
