PNEUMONIA YIELDS TO TREATMENT

CONCESSION OF SCIENTISTS VERIFIES OSTEOPATHIC THEORY.—THE GERM ONLY AN AUXILIARY CAUSE AND OSTEOPATHY FINDS AND CORRECTS THE ORIGINAL ONE

Recently this journal published comments upon the finding of the Pneumonia Commission, which has been conducting investigations under the auspices of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research and now that the annual harvest of death thru this disease is beginning the facts then brot out requires fresh emphasis.

Briefly the commission found that pneumonia is caused by a germ, and its chief recommendations were made with the aim of preventing the communication of that germ from one person to another. Yet it was admitted in the report of the commission that the pneumococcus, or pneumonia germ, was found in the mouths of nineteen out of twenty-one sound and healthy persons upon whom tests were made, which would seem to indicate that efforts to prevent the communication of the germ from one person to another will be of little avail.
