AMERICAN ANARCHISTS ARRESTED

London, Nov. 15.—It is announced that a number of Paterson, New Jersey, anarchists have been arrested at Naples. It is rumored and alleged that they were there to assassinate the king of Italy and the Duke and Duchess of Acosta.

Naples, Italy, Nov. 15.—Gatrilie Lanseetta and a man whose name is unknown but said to be a cousin of Lanseetta, was arrested today to prevent the assassination of the King, Duke and Dutchess. Lanseetta acknowledged that he had a commission, obtained from a secret meeting in New Jersey to kill the King and his cousin. The officers expect to find evidence which will result in many arrests being made in America.

IMPENDING FAMINE IN CHINA

London, Nov. 15.—The condition of affairs in Northern China has not been exaggerated as ten million natives are on the brink of starvation. A consular report made public here today states that the authorities are trying to prevent an exodus of people from North Kiangsu and Peking but are taking no steps to provide them with food. Up to the present the disorders are slight but it is feared they will become serious.
