ACTED WISELY

President Roosevelt's action in ordering the summary dismissal without honor of every man in three companies of the Twenty-Fifth Infantry (colored), unprecedented as it is, seems to be wholly justified by the circumstances of this peculiar incident. It meets with the unqualified approval of every officer who is on the side of good discipline, and should be applauded by every civilian who is on the side of law and order.

On the night of August 15th a party of soldiers from Fort Brown, where these three companies were stationed, engaged in disturbances in Brownsville, which resulted in the killing of one citizen and the serious wounding of another. A strict investigation was made, but the guilty could not be found. Under orders from the President, Inspector General Garlington went to Brownsville, but his investigation was fruitless. Not one man in the three companies at Fort Brown would give any information leading to the detection of the guilty ones. General Garlington thereupon made the recommendation that the three companies be dismissed from the service, which recommendation the President has approved.

That a man should not "peach" on his comrade is a beautiful theory, but when this comrade commits a crime—in this case it is the crime of murder—the law calls the man who knows, and who takes active steps to shield the criminal, an accessory. Investigators are convinced there is not a man in the three companies who could not give information which would assist in locating the guilty.

The President's action is one that will make much for good discipline in the army. Certain soldiers, by reason of their long service and faithfulness, are raised to be non-commissioned officers. They are the ones who really command the men in the ranks, who are really responsible for discipline. They are the ones who must learn—and this action will go far to teach them—that they owe a duty to the country whose uniform they wear further than they are called upon to show on the parade ground. They

MUST BE HONEST

Special agent Burrill's report from South Australia concerning the deceptive methods followed by some exporters of American shoes deserves the attention of the boot and shoe manufacturers. Nothing destroys trade so quickly as the sale of a second or third grade article for first class. The American butter and cheese trade in the United Kingdom was practically destroyed years ago by the sale of adulterated and imitation articles, and that trade has never been fully reestablished. The sale of inferior articles caused losses in the Australian trade in American vehicles and automobiles, and now there is complaint of similar work in the boot and shoe trade. The subject requires the immediate attention of the manufacturers, tho they may not be at fault.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

Consul-General Robert J. Wynne writes from London that the total British imports for the first nine months of 1906 amounted to \$2,156,005,319, an increase of \$168,745,887, or 7.94 per cent, over the corresponding period of last year. The exports in the same time advanced 14.71 per cent, the figures being \$1,553,150,983.
