SIXTY TEACHERS WILL GO

Next Monday is the opening day for the sixth annual convention of Eastern Oregon Teacher's Association at Pendleton.

County Superintendent Bragg, who is also a member of the association's executive committee, contemplates that sixty or more teachers of Union county will be present. Union, Cove and Elgin teachers will go in a body, as will the teachers of this city. Personal letters have been mailed each teacher in the county, explaining that teachers are allowed a day off, but unless they report at Pendleton, a day's pay will be deducted.

Those who attend, should not fail to get a certificate from the local ticket agent, which, when signed by the secretary at Pendleton will insure a one third return fare. This is imperative as the certificate is the only thing that will insure the reduced rates.

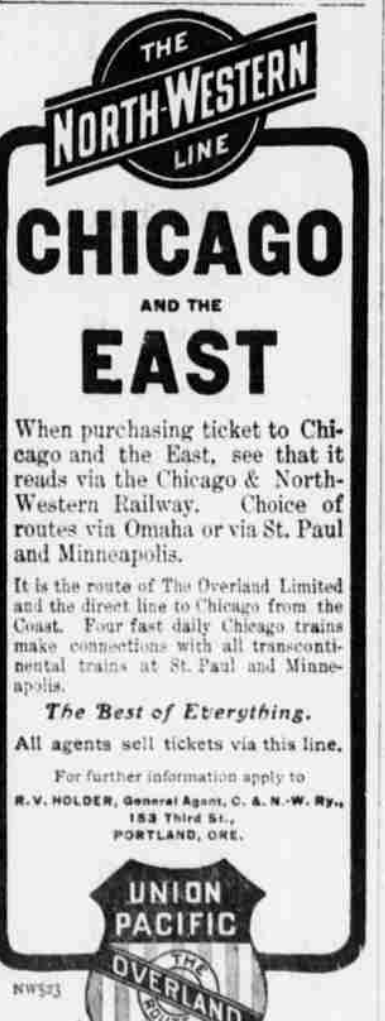
