## WALLOWA BRIDGE THREATENED

Wallowa county too, has been suffering from the continued rains. For the past few days the Wallowa bridge, which crosses the Wallowa at the new town of Minam, and which was constructed last spring, has been threatened with destruction. Up to last evening it was momentarily expected that the high waters would dislodge the new structure but since yesterday afternoon the river has been lowering and as the bridge still remains in fact, it will likely remain so. On Wednesday the stage lines carried only mail, but yesterday passenger traffic was again resumed.

For two days the water completely covered the bridge, even raising to such a height that the few buildings which compose the town of Minam, were threatened.
