

# WASHINGTON-EUGENE STRUGGLE POSTPONED

U. of O. Eugene Nov. 17.—Washouts in Western Washington have made it impossible for the Washington University team to arrive here in time to play today, but it is likely that the game will be played next Monday.

The game, which decides the championship of the Northwest, had attracted visitors to this city from all parts of Washington and Oregon, but the Seattle aggregation is completely isolated. It is very likely that tracks will be repaired sufficiently to allow the team and rooters to arrive here Monday. If such is the case, Kincaid field will be alive with excitement Monday.

In anticipation of the game today, a mass meeting and rally was held last evening at which college songs were re-

hearsed. Oregon's spirit is running high, and the slight delay failed to dampen it. The field is muddy today and will remain so for several days, thus eliminating possibilities of place kicking, and scores will of necessity be by touchdowns.

The University Glee Club will not be in La Grande this year. Their manager has decided to tour Southern Oregon instead of the eastern part of the state. There will be no Thanksgiving concert in Portland, as no theater can be secured for that night.

The juniors have decided to get out a class publication next spring.

# FOOTBALL SCORES TODAY

Minneapolis, Nov. 16.—Two hundred Indians from the White Earth and Cass Lake reservations are in the city today to witness the game between Minnesota's varsity and the Carlisle Indians.
