MEDFORD FACTORY

The Medford Tribune reports that the Ingham factory at Medford, Oregon, has been making over a hundred barrels of vinegar per day this fall.

The factory at that place has paid about \$4 per ton for apples but the supply has not been sufficiently large to be satisfactory and the grinding season was very short. The factory used 1200 bushels of apples in a day of ten hours. The proportion of cull apples in the vicinity of Medford is small and many of the orchardists had so few this year that they did not think it worth while to gather them up and haul them to the factory.
