MOUNTAIN HOME MAYOR STRIKES FROM SHOULDER

The Mayor of Mountain Home, Idaho, is made of the proper stuff.

When the railroad officials received the message from Mayor Mahoney last week, to the effect that he had been instructed by twenty-eight leading citizens to cut out coal cars from passing trains when needed, turn the coal over to local dealers have them collect and pay the company; unless the agreement entered into between the railroad and the citizens be complied with, the superintendent of this division instructed the agent here to sue out an injunction should the mayor attempt to carry out his program. That looked like a scrap was brewing; but Monday the company left two cars here of its own account which relieved the tension of the

situation. Sunday, the town's coal supply having become exhausted, the rustlers got busy and relieved one train of five cars. Mayor Mahoney appeared on the scene and ordered them to "ring off" which they did without protest.

A man was employed to guard this unloaded coal that night and it was delivered to the agent Monday. Mayor Mahoney says he thinks the railroad company has a better understanding of the situation here now than heretofore and that they will not in the future ignore their promise to furnish three cars a week. There is nothing the matter with Mahoney. Bennett Elson received notice Friday that a 55 ton car had been loaded for them at the mines.

THE HOME THAT INSPIRED

"HOME SWEET HOME"

East Hampton, L. I., Nov. 19.—While the bones of John Howard Payne lie mouldering in an obscure grave in far off Algeria. "Home sweet Home" the little thatched cottage in which he was raised and which inspired his immortal ballad, when he was a wanderer on the face of the earth, is about to go the way of all things.

Today the work of demolition commenced to make way for a new edifice for St. Marks Church. Payne was little more than a lad when he set forth from East Hampton to seek his fortune and he never returned. Leading a nomad life, he

spent his remaining years in Europe, and finally died and was buried in Tunis.

It was in Paris, while in an almost destitute condition that he wrote the famous song, and it is stated that when his opera "Maid of Milan" was produced in London and when he was in his zenith and courted by royalty he first used the expression "be it ever so humble there is no place like home." His opera "Clari" had a long run in Paris and subsequently in London and when his mortal remains were being laid to rest in the Algerian City some American visitors who were present sang his beautiful song "Home Sweet Home."

RICHEST WOMAN IN ENGLAND

London, Nov. 19.—Lady Mary Hamilton, who celebrates her birthday anniversary today, is the richest woman in Great Britain. She is the daughter of the late Duke of Hamilton, who died in 1895. She is a famous horsewoman and one of the few women to undertake the duties of Master of hounds. Her grandmother was a daughter of the Grand Duke of Baden and a cousin of Napoleon III. Her aunt married, first the Prince of Monaco, and then an Austrian nobleman, and among her other relations are the Duke of Newcastle, the Duke of Somerset and the Duchess of Devonshire. Lady Mary loves outdoor sports of all kinds, rarely visits London, and is at home on the hills of the Isles of Arran. She is an expert angler and declares that though she admires all good men, she intends continuing her work amongst the Scottish poor and helping the crofters in every way she can. Lady Mary is one of the most popular women in the King's realm.

NEVADA MINING COMBINE

Carson City, Nev., Nov. 19.—The Mohawk-Jumbo Consolidated Mining Co. has been organized here with a capital of \$2,000,000 shares of the par value of \$10 each. 500,000 shares of the new company have been exchanged for 1,000,000 shares of the Jumbo Mining Co. and other shares in the Red Top Mohawk and Laguna Companies have been dealt. All the exchanges involve the issue of \$3,200,000 of the new Consolidated Co. leaving it with \$1,800,000 in the Treasury. It is estimated that in 1907 the company will have a monthly earning power of \$1,000,000.


