WISHES OF CITIZENS ARE IGNORED

Joseph, Ore., Nov. 17.—Councilmen Weber and Hall recently removed from the city and over 60 citizens petitioned the members of the council remaining to appoint Ex-Councilman F. F. McCully and Dr. J. H. Thompson to fill the vacancies. When the petition was presented, the council proceeded to elect H. D. Akins a merchant, and Frank Stevenson, an ex-saloonkeeper and merchant. The petitioners were the leading men of the town in social and business circles, and much feeling has been aroused against the councilmen in thus ignoring the wishes of the people.

At the same session the council removed from office the marshal, for absence from the city for the period covered by the charter.

After the local option law went into effect, a marshal was deemed unnecessary, and the council lowered the salary from \$50 to \$15 monthly. The incumbent was dissatisfied, and would not give up the office as the council evidently hoped, but found other employment. Removal is the council's next move. J. D. Walck was appointed to the place temporarily.

It is unlikely that any permanent appointment will be made, as under the new charter now being drafted, the marshal will be elected by the council and not by the people, as now.

Exhibition Without License

At a big mass meeting held at Hood River Saturday afternoon, for the purpose of ascertaining public feeling in regard to the movement to create a new county, to be known as Cascade county, the sentiment was unanimous and committees will be appointed to circulate petitions to be presented to the next legislature with that object in view.

RAGING GRANDE RONDE

The Grande Ronde river is on a regular tear from the recent rains. The mail carrier between Flora and Bartlett failed to cross yesterday. Wednesday, the Sheltyn ferry would not cross, excepting at the risk of the passengers. Much timber, railroad ties etc. are said to be floating down the stream.—Flora Journal.
