MEMORIAL TO A SIGNER

(Scripps News Association)
Edenton, N. C., Nov. 21.—A memorial tablet was dedicated here today, to James Wilson, the famous justice of the supreme court of the United States, and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. In July, last, Senator Knox and Secretary Konkle decided at Valley Forge to have the body of Judge Wilson removed to its proper resting place beside the body of his wife at Christ Church, Philadelphia. A committee, consisting of Attorney General Carson, Governor Pennypacker, Senator Penrose, Chief Justice Mitchell, State Senator Sproul, Frances Rawle, of the American Bar Association, and Alex Simpson, Jr., of the Pennsylvania Bar Association, was formed for this purpose and informal possession of the body has been obtained from J. G. Wood, of this city, through Iredell Mears, of Wilmington, a descendant of Justice Iredell, at whose home Wilson died. The body will be removed on Thursday, when it is expected that there will be a full attendance of members of the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, and the Wilson Memorial Committee and the organizations with which Wilson was identified.

AN INLAND EMPIRE FEAT

(Dayton, Wash. Dispatch.)
People passing the W. Kendall and A. Volmer places this fall have been dumfounded by seeing those gentlemen pitching hay from their fields on the bluffs into their barns in the valley below with ordinary pitchforks, and as they have stood and watched the performance, they have almost doubted the correctness of their vision until, by closer observation, they have discovered the trick by which it was done. The idea, which first originated with Mr. Kendall, is to string a dozen wires from the bluffs above to his barn door, and by loading on a good-sized bunch of hay at one time, practically none of it will scatter through the wires, but will slide into the barn as slick as you please. Of course anyone observing the work from a distance cannot see the fork on the bluff and descend several hundred feet and land in the hay loft. Until the secret of the performance is understood, the feat appears incredulous.

Academy of Medicine

"An organization of physicians, to be known as the Portland Academy of Medicine, has been formed by a number of the oldest practitioners of the city, on lines similar to those of the New York Academy of Medicine. At the present time there are 25 charter members, but the full Portland membership, when the society is completed, will be 50.

The permanent organization will be effected at a meeting which is to be held in December, when the other 25 members will be admittee and the society started out upon its career.

The work of the academy will be purely scientific and its purpose will be the information and uplifting of its members to a higher plane of knowledge and research. In addition to the membership of 50 there will be out-of-town members, known as fellows, besides associate fellows, honorary fellows and benefactors. Annual meetings will be held, and in the near future a building will perhaps be erected, or suitable quarters provided, in which the academy will install a library and other property necessary for carrying on the research of the members.—Portland Journal.
