**CHINAMEN MAKE RICH DISCOVERIES**  
(Scripps News Association)  
Port Townsend, Wash., Nov. 25—It is reported here that Chinamen have again struck it rich in the British Columbia diggings in the Tuamane Valley near Bear Creek in the Samilkameen district. They are at present washing the ground which was supposed to have been worked out in the big rush of 1859 and last month two of them cleared up \$1,600 in gold and \$400 in platinum. In the early days, platinum was considered worthless and the miners cursed their luck when they struck it as it was so difficult to separate from the gold.  
Of late years these old dumps have been looked up and hundreds of dollars in platinum then cast away, has been recovered by individual prospectors. It is calculated that there is yet a vast amount of this metal lying in the old tailings.

While not changing the total, we made an error, as reported in last night's paper, in segregating the cost of the dam and pipe line. **WILL CLOSE THE GALLON HOUSES**

The gallon houses and dives in Minam of this county are to be routed out by the wholesale. To accomplish this, District Attorney Ivanhoe and C. H. Crawford left this morning for Elgin where the case will be heard. The District Attorney is backed in his work of enforcing the laws of Union county, by the O. R. & N. Construction Company, and has as his assistant, C. H. Crawford, who represents the construction companies in the suits.  
The town of Minam is nothing more or less than a mixture of saloons, gallon houses and dives. It is not the intention of the attorneys to prosecute the licensed saloon-keepers, but they are going after the ones who are selling liquor without a license and the women who infest that place. These conditions have hampered the work of constructing the road, for the employers are unable to keep men any length of time. They will probably come over the river into Union county and carouse and spend the greater portion of their time there. Knowing this to be true, the District Attorney is set on routing them out and took with him fifteen complaints and will stay with the good work until he has them scattered. The hearings will be made at Elgin beginning with today and will continue until all are disposed of.

**RESOLUTIONS VOTED DOWN**

(Scripps News Association)  
Kansas City, Nov. 23—Resolutions presented by the executive committee last evening were voted down. Two resolutions were submitted by William Bryan one endorsing an inter-parliamentary union on peace plans.

J. P. Riggins, of Beaumont, Texas, before the Trans-Mississippi Congress, defended the trusts and railroads against the radical speakers, who have appeared before the congress. He introduced a resolution seeking to modify the law and said that the rate bill law, turned railroads in their extensions of lines. A hot reply was given to these statements by C. L. Ivane of St. Louis, who says that the rate bill would in any way prevent line extensions.

Mrs. C. C. Tennant, the only woman delegate at the convention, opposed the Commerce Commission's ruling that newspapers could not exchange advertising for transportation.
