EXPOSE OF NORMAL SCHOOLS

after leaving the high school. In five years still a better course could be given. In this course as I have given it to you I have allowed no place for the study of any language save our mother tongue, and yet every teacher should have a good course in Latin and some knowledge of German would be valuable. A few moments ago I alluded to the fact that many prominent educators are of the opinion that normal schools should be pedagogical schools and nothing more. I suggested that if we take this view of the matter we should urge the establishment of schools between the high school and the normal schools. Perhaps I should have added that knowledge such as I advocated can not be secured at our colleges, at least, not as they are conducted at the present time. Neither can it be secured at any of our universities, so far as I know. The universities provide for the need of every other profession save ours. I am aware that many of our universities have a department of pedagogy but it does not do such work as I have mentioned. I have already alluded to the fact that such a course will find no students. Such a fear may be well grounded but I doubt it. I am willing to concede that it might be the better way to reach such a standard gradually. Our people are slow to change. When the medical schools raised the standard they did it gradually. It is not so many years since every medical college in this country accepted high school graduates as members of the freshman class. Thirty years ago Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia allowed one of my students to enter although he could not pass the eight grade examination, and Jefferson was then as now, one of the largest medical colleges in the United States. If you had said then that in thirty years the foremost medical school of Philadelphia would demand an A. B. degree for entrance and talk seriously of a five years course you would have been regarded as a harmless lunatic. With such an example before us, I honestly believed that in less than ten years a normal course lasting four years would not be regarded as being too long. Allow me to suggest a course that I think would be eminently practical at the present time.

Let our normal schools add an additional year to their course and reteach Reading, Arithmetic, U. S. History, Geography and English Grammar, the most poorly taught of what are usually called the common school branches. Then let a post-graduate course of two years be established at our state university or at one of the normal schools and be put in charge of some good normal man who has had a thorough education. If some university professor be put in charge you had as well write Ichabod upon it at the beginning as at a later period. This would make a practical course for our teachers and it is not at all out of reach at the present. In fact some of our normal graduates now go to normal schools in California and other states for the preparation which our own state does not supply. To say that some of us are ashamed of such a state of things is only to say that we have a little state pride. California puts the ban upon every educational paper granted by the state of Oregon save our life diploma and that has a "when" added to its acception. She accepts the normal diplomas of Washington, Utah, and Nevada and refuses ours. That alone should make Oregon resolve that our normal schools shall be the peers of any other normal schools in the nation.

It is to the interest of every teacher in Oregon that the normal schools shall set the standard high as that is the standard by which the profession of teaching in any state is measured, and justly too. Surely the best teachers should be those who have been trained for their profession. Will you permit me to digress enough to say that I sometimes doubt whether our work deserves to be called a profession. In that a profession which can be taken up by any callow boy, or bashful maiden in her teens, who needs a little ready cash, followed for a year or two, and then abandoned for something more lucrative? Honestly, I doubt it. So long as the normal schools set the standard low, so long will the people, in order to get cheap work, set the standard lower still.

If the members of the profession are content that its standard of entrance shall be low they have no right to complain about being poorly paid. Ten cents worth of investment can not be expected to bring more than ten cents worth of income.

Graduation at one of our normal schools reminds me very much of taking a business course at many of our high schools. The course lasts for only one or two years and every idler and mutton head in the high school takes the business course. By this I do not mean that no bright boys and girls will go to the normal schools but I do mean that the normal schools will get most of the runts, the small potatoes, the nubbins, the culis. The students, the ambitious boys and girls, will be attracted to the colleges and universities. As proof of this fact permit me to state that, so far as I know, not a graduate of our high school in the past five years has expressed even a desire to attend a normal school. Those who intend to teach have gone to our
