THE SUGAR BEET CROP SAFE

"That don't look so bad does it?" said A. E. Huff, this afternoon as he handed the editor a five pound sugar beet which had just been taken from the underground. "That beet does not look as if the cold weather had hurt it much," he continued as he proceeded to inform the editor that he had just set a force of men at work plowing out the remainder of his crop which will amount to two hundred and seventy-five tons. The beet not-with-

the snow for the past several days was as "good as new." The factory officials estimate that there is in the neighborhood of three thousand tons of beets still in the ground, and for a time it was feared that this tonnage would be a total loss, but this morning scores of teams were sent to the fields and within a few days all the beets will have been saved.
