Pay days come and pay days go but bills roll on forever.

Many a home is furnished to meet the approving opinions of one's neighbors. Bad policy, that.

It's easy enough to be pleasant to casual acquaintances; the difficulty is being decent to those who are devoted enough to forgive us.

While the unusually high price of wood may work a hardship upon not a few. The timber is too close to town to cause any great amount of intense suffering.

The football season in this state is practically ended and so far not a fatality has been reported. The new rules have reduced the chances for injury considerably.

Oregon nurserymen report a big demand for apple trees, especially from Idaho and Montana. The varieties most in demand are Baldwins, Spitzenbergs and Gravensteins.

The rapid increase in Oregon timber is shown in the fact that stumpage on the lower Columbia sells at \$14 a thousand feet, whereas a few years ago it could be bought as low as \$4.

The withdrawal of the several tow-ship, now temporarily, but which in all probability will later be made permanent and added to the Blue Mountain Forest Reserve takes about all of the remaining timber that was left.

We have the busiest month of the year ahead of us. Aside from the usual necessities during the next three weeks the Christmas shopping will be on us and if a record breaking year in prosperity indicates anything, it means that the prosperity will manifest itself in during the holidays.

The new train schedule means much for La Grande. North Powder people can reach this city in the morning without getting up in the middle of the night. This means that many people from the southern portion of the county will trade here formerly. It will also be quite an accommodation to our own people who travel west.

The weekly paper published in the Ohio State prison has been discontinued, for the reason that there are no printers in the institution at the present time.

There are enough bankers in the institution to start a clearing house, enough lawyers to take care of all the business the frenzied financiers can bring them enough doctors to keep all the prisoners in good health, plenty of preachers to give them spiritual advice, but they must depend on the outside papers to give them news.—Exchange.

Congress meets next Monday. Practically all of the senators and congressmen are already on the ground, ready for business. The President's message, this session, will be awaited with interest as he will undoubtedly outline the legislation that will receive the greatest attention of this session. On and after March 4, next Oregon will once more have her quota of representation. Congressmen, Ellis of this district and Hawley of the first district will take their seats and in January the legislature will give Mr. Bourne his certificate of election.
