FRAUD IN COFFEE

Inferior grades of coffee cannot be put in ships' manifests as peas and beans, shipped from this country to Porto Rico and then reshipped from there to other countries and in some instances back to the United States, as high grade Porto Rican coffee, have been the subject of an investigation by the Department of Commerce and Labor. Instructions have been given to the collector of customs at New York to see to it that the manifests of vessels clearing for Porto Rico be examined with care to prevent fraud, apprehend the perpetrators and prosecute them on charges of perjury.
